Dear Friend of the Minnesota Council on Economic Education,

The international financial disruptions are painful reminders of the importance of the Council's work. While we are pleased to report another successful year, the need for more financially knowledgeable citizens, employees, and leaders is very clear. As the organization that supports Minnesota K-12 teachers and non-profits who work to improve economic and financial literacy, we want you to know that. . .

- **Teachers demonstrated their strong interest in Council programs.**
This year, 530 teachers participated in our workshops and courses.
- **Personal Finance Decathlon Online was offered for the first time.**
One hundred and fourteen students from seven schools participated.
- **First Annual Conference for Teachers of Economics and Personal Finance: K-12 was held at the University of Minnesota, St. Paul.**
More than one hundred participants attended the two-day conference.
- **Minnesota high school students excelled in national competition.**
 - Little Falls High School placed fourth in this year's national *Economics Challenge* competition.
 - Over 400 students entered state *Economics Challenge* competitions sponsored by the Council's network of Centers for Economics Education at five university campuses in Minnesota.
- ***Economics Challenge Online* participation increased in its second year.**
This year, 229 students participated, compared to last year's 43 students.
- **The Economic Systems course added special sessions for agriculture teachers.**
- **The Community Mentorship program trained 11 community based agencies.**
Partnership with U of M Extension expanded the reach of economics and personal finance education to low income individuals, families and communities.

The Minnesota Council continues its innovative work to help teachers become more expert in delivering economics and personal finance understanding in the classroom.


For 47 years the Council has believed that best practice teaching is the key to economic and personal financial literacy in the United States. Effective teachers, reaching broad numbers of students, can inspire productive workers, knowledgeable consumers and financially responsible citizens. This is the most effective and efficient approach to the current global challenge.

Council Programs

Professional Development Programs for Teachers

■ Week-long Summer Courses

(Courses also include two follow-up sessions, a final project, and classroom observations; participants receive graduate credit.)

Using Children's Literature to Teach Economics and Personal Finance, for teachers of grades 3-8

This course is designed for teachers who wish to acquire more skills and knowledge of economic and personal finance concepts to integrate into the classroom using children's literature.

Economic Systems, for teachers grades 9-12

This course helps high school educators prepare students to meet state academic standards in economics. The course includes a review of basic economic concepts, use of materials to augment interactive learning, and a computer lab demonstration of the *Virtual Economics* CD. Content areas include micro, macro, and international economics.

Enhancing Social Studies Curricula with Economics, for teachers grades 7-12

This course is designed for social studies educators who wish to increase their understanding of economics to integrate into the social studies curricula. Economic principles are taught through the demonstration of lessons that integrate economic principles into history, civics, and geography.

■ Camps & Workshops

Economics of Energy and the Environment Camp, for teachers grades 6-12

This four-day camp includes classroom instruction and site visits for teachers who wish to help students understand the connections between economics, energy, and the environment.

Personal Finance Camp, for teachers grades 6-12

This four-day camp is designed to provide teachers with materials and learning activities that help their students attain the personal finance skills they need to make intelligent choices about managing money, making financial decisions and investing in themselves.

Math and Econ: Connections for Life, for teachers grades 3-5

The workshop helps teachers reinforce mathematics concepts and processes by using examples from economics and personal finance.

Focus: Grades 3-5 Economics

Teachers learn to use simulations, stories, and role playing to illustrate for students the effects of economics in everyday life.

Personal Finance Workshops are based on one or more of the following materials:

Financial Fitness for Life, grades K-12 helps students apply economics and decision-making skills to earning, spending, saving, using credit, and managing money.

Risky Business: What Every Teenager Needs to Know About Living Smart (DVD) develops decision-making skills. Students improve their ability to manage risk by addressing decisions regarding higher education, healthy lifestyles, credit, and insurance.

■ Conferences

Conference on Teaching Economics and Personal Finance: K-12

This two-day conference, organized by the MN Council, brings together experienced K-12 teachers, Junior Achievement and BestPrep staff members, U of M Extension Educators, Directors of the Centers for Economic Education, faculty members of U of M Department of Curriculum and Instruction, and staff of the Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis to provide educators with curricula, innovative teaching methods, and creative learning activities they can use in their classroom.

Winter Institute

St. Cloud State University's Center for Economic Education hosts the annual *Winter Institute*, which includes workshops and guest speakers focusing on the topics of economic development and education.

Council Programs (continued)

Student Competitions

■ *Economics Challenge*

Teams of high school students from Minnesota compete in local *Economics Challenge* competitions where they answer a series of challenging multiple choice questions. A lightning fast buzzer-round determines the winners of each competition. *EconChallenge ONLINE!* made it possible to expand the contest by including competitors using the Internet. Winning teams advance to state and multi-state regional competitions. Regional winners compete in New York City for the national championship.

■ *Personal Finance Decathlon (grades 9-12)*

Personal Finance Decathlon is a fun and challenging way to learn personal finance concepts. Students are tested in ten areas: thinking economically, earning income, paying taxes, budgeting, saving, financial planning, investing, borrowing, banking, and insuring. The four highest scoring teams from different high schools will compete in the state championship.

■ *Global Food Challenge (grades 9-12)*

This student contest is based on research projects developed in conjunction with one of the *Global Food Challenge* units. Students research issues related to the economics of the food industry and write papers. Competition winners selected by a panel of judges receive cash prizes.

Educator Awards and Scholarships

■ **Educator Awards**

3M Innovative Economic Educator Award recognizes teachers who create and implement innovative projects that increase economic understanding at the elementary and secondary levels.

Thrivent Financial Foundation Personal Finance Educator Award is presented to elementary and secondary teachers demonstrating creativity in the teaching of personal finance concepts.

3M Economic Educator Excellence Award annually recognizes a teacher who has a sustained history of commitment and contribution to economic education.

■ **Houck Memorial Scholarship Fund**

This scholarship was created in memory of Professor James P. Houck, a distinguished economist and friend of the Council. The scholarship offers teachers the opportunity to take an intermediate level economics courses offered by the Department of Applied Economics, University of Minnesota.

Outreach

■ *Community Mentorship Program*

In conjunction with University of Minnesota Extension, the Council's affiliated Center for Personal and Family Financial Education prepares community educators to deliver financial education programs to the state's underserved and new immigrant populations.

■ *EconFest*

This annual fall event, organized by the Council and its many partners, celebrates teacher accomplishments and promotes economic education in Minnesota.
